

From the Pastor ...

How much wood would a woodchuck chuck if a woodchuck could chuck wood?

Admit it.

You just read that out loud.

And tried to say it a few times.

Fast.

How many did you get through before your twisted tongue tripped you up?

My kids have recently discovered the joy of tongue twisters.

You can imagine what life in our house is like right now!

I was listening to Ian and Luke trying to scramble their way through yet another tongue twister the other morning while I was getting ready to go to work (they were even trying to make up a few of their own ... I'm sure you can imagine!), and I started thinking about what it is about tongue twisters that draws us, that intrigues us so much.

She sells seashells by the seashore.

You see, there's something both frustrating and hilarious about trying to say one thing yet having something else entirely come out of our mouths.

Six slick snakes slid down the slippery slough.

It's silly. It's fun. It's the same reason that the game Telephone is so much fun in elementary school: the distortion of an original message into something trivial and nonsensical.

A freezy breeze made these three trees freeze.

Sure, it's fun when it's a bunch of crazy phrases that we try to say as fast as possible. It's fun when, really, the ultimate goal is to say it wrong.

But what about when it comes to the message of our faith? What about the good news of the gospel?

I think that often we find it difficult to put words to our faith. Part of that has to do with the mysterious nature of faith. We worship a God who we cannot see or hear or touch – a God who we cannot empirically prove. We can't explain how Jesus rose from the dead. We can't explain nor can we prove the efficacy of prayer ... and yet, we pray. And don't even ask about the Holy Spirit and the whole Trinity thing!

At the same time, we know that we are called to not only believe but to share our belief through our actions and our words. We're called to witness to the good news of the gospel: that through his life, death, and resurrection, Jesus Christ made God's unmerited and unconditional love available to all. This is the central truth of our faith. Trusting in this is at the heart of who we are and what we believe as Christians.

Sure, there are other aspects of what and how we believe, but that's the essence.

Throughout the centuries – and especially over the last 100 yrs. – the message of the gospel has become muddled. It's become tongue tied and tethered to a whole load of other people's ideals and interpretations and distinctly human agendas. It's been twisted and weighed down by other people's prejudices and deep-seated hatred.

But in truth, the good news of the gospel is bigger than that.

It's bigger than the little, culturally-familiar box we try to force it into.

It's bigger than the little, nation-centric box we try to force it into.

It's bigger than the little, politically-manipulated box we try to force it into.

It's bigger than us and our dreams. It's bigger than us and our fears. It's bigger than us and our misunderstandings. It's bigger than us and our twisted tongues.

Thankfully, in the face of all that, Paul both reminds and reassures us:

Offer prayers and petitions in the Spirit all the time. Stay alert by hanging in there and praying for all believers. As for me, pray that when I open my mouth, I'll get a message that confidently makes this secret plan of the gospel known. I'm an ambassador in chains for the sake of the gospel. Pray so that the Lord will give me the confidence to say what I have to say. – Ephesians 6:18-20

We may not get it right all the time.

We may end up with unsure words and twisted tongues.

But if we hold close to the message of God's love lived and taught and resurrected in Christ Jesus, God can speak to us and through us still – a message that is pure and holy and comes out right every time:

God loves you.

God loves you.

God loves vou.

Toy boat. Toy boat. Toy boat.

Keeping Up with the Smith-Mathers



We've been helping to support Shelvis and Nancy and their family for a few years now. We've been collecting our 2nd Sunday Spare Change offering and lifting them up in prayer. We need to lift them up even more in prayer right now, friends. The COVID-19 pandemic has rocked their world as well. In their most recent update letter, they shared that Nancy is pregnant again (another girl: Alice) but there is a problem with the baby's heart that will require surgical intervention when she is a year old. In addition to this concern, ahead of the U.S. borders closing this past March, they decided to leave Great Britain and come home to be with family in the U.S. As they have attempted to find some semblance of being settled, they have moved their entire family a number of times this year already: 4 different homes in the last 6 months, according to their letter. Like many overseas missions organizations, the PC(USA) has extended their travel ban for mission personnel to June 30, 2021, so they know they aren't headed back to Africa anytime soon. And because of choices and restrictions put in place by Oxford University, Shelvis is unable to continue his doctoral program at this time and has had to take a temporary leave of absence.

It is a lot, friends. In this time of uncertainty and upheaval, Shelvis and Nancy and their family clearly still need our prayers, and they still need our support. I know that we're not gathering our spare change offering as we continue to meet virtually, but you can still help support Shelvis and Nancy. Visit their Presbyterian Mission Agency page:

You can also click on the blue box that says "Subscribe to our letters" to start receiving Shelvis and Nancy's occasional updates in your inbox. They send a wonderful, entertaining, touchingly personal update roughly quarterly.

COVID- Safe Communion Practice

At least throughout the summer, our monthly communion procedure will be a little different. Instead of the deacons passing the plates with the bread and juice/wine from person to person, we'll have a table set up on your way into the sanctuary. On communion Sundays, you'll be invited to pick up a pre-packaged and sealed juice cup and a small package of crackers. When it comes time for communion, you'll be asked to open the crackers (as the bread) and the juice and partake where you are. There will be a couple garbage cans around the sanctuary that will give you a place to discard the packaging on your way out after worship.



Toward the end of the summer, the deacons will reevaluate where things are at with CDC recommendations, state requirements, etc. to determine what we'll do in the fall.

Virtual Worship Going Forward

We are continuing to stream our worship services for anyone who doesn't feel comfortable coming back into the building. The good news is we are still able to stream on Facebook Live. For those who don't use Facebook, we're also streaming our service right on the front page of the church website. I know that there have been some glitches with this, and I beg your patience and understanding as I orient myself to the ins and outs of the new technology.

The challenge with all the planning for this has come with prayer time. I want to maintain the powerful, meaningful time of sharing our lives and prayers together that we've always enjoyed in the past. At the same time, I'm very cognizant of the privacy aspect and trying not to broadcast everyone's personal information out onto the internet. After doing this whole hybrid worship thing for a month, one thing has definitely become clear – juggling all the technology required for both streaming the services and attempting to Zoom our prayer time before worship is too much to handle. For this reason, we will be discontinuing the preworship Zoom prayer time. Amazon Smile



Good news! A while back, the Session discussed setting up an Amazon Smile account for the church. The first time I tried it, it was before Kim went through the incredible amount of work he did to re-establish our 501(c)3 status. I was recently reminded of this endeavor (thanks, Mom!), so I thought I'd try again. And it worked!

So how does Amazon Smile work? For your designated organization, Amazon donates 0.5% of eligible Amazon purchases to that organization. And now, you can officially designate the church as your organization! There are two ways that you can do this:

- 1) Type this link into your web browser and click the "Start shopping" button. https://smile.amazon.com/ch/41-1434567. Another page will pop up with a checkbox that says, "Yes, I understand that I must always start at smile.amazon.com to support Presbyterian Church of ORONOCO." Click the checkbox, then click the "Start shopping" button. Anytime that you shop with Amazon after that, you need to do so by going to http://smile.amazon.com, not the regular Amazon homepage.
- 2) Go to the Amazon homepage and type "Amazon Smile" into the search bar. If you've already got a charity that you've been donating a portion of your Amazon purchases to and would like to switch to the church, simply click on the "Change my organization" link. If not, search for "Presbyterian Church of Oronoco" and select us as your designated organization.




All Around the Campfire

Pine Island Area Home Services




PIAHS is also always looking for people willing to be generous with either their volunteer time or their financial giving. You can contact them further if you're interested in helping out in any way.
