A Message from Our Pastor

Sometimes I look around our house and wonder, "Where in the world did all this *stuff* come from?!"

When you're pregnant, people who have already had kids warn you that babies come with a lot of stuff. And you hear it ... but there's something about it that just doesn't register. You think to yourself, "Sure, they may come with a lot of stuff, but it's small stuff, right? Babies are small, so their stuff can't be that big." And then you have a baby shower or two, and you're so excited by all the adorable things and the fun things and the useful-looking things that you don't stop and think, "Hey, I've gotta fit all these things into my house."

Four months into being a mom of twin boys, let me tell you something: *Babies come with A LOT of stuff*.

Is it fun stuff? Yes. Is it useful stuff? You bet! Is it cute stuff? Oh, yeah. But it still amazes me how much *stuff* these two little beings have generated in such a short amount of time!

And I will admit that the challenge some days is not letting the stuff get in the way of enjoying our wonderful boys. I have learned that there will **always** be laundry to do. There will **always** be things to pick up. There will **always** be bottles to wash and other things around the house that we could be doing. But most importantly, the Luke and Ian will **always** need our care and our love. And if we don't give it to them, who will? The laundry, the cleaning up, and all the other menial tasks of the day can wait.

And this concept is not so different from our faith, is it? There will **always** be things that need to be done. If you're a "to do" list maker like I am, you know that there's something about a "to do" list (or maybe in your house it's a "honey do" list ... we have one of those, too!) that never gets shorter. I think it's some as-yet-undiscovered law of the universe – the length of the "to do" list cannot be shorter than 3 items.

There will always be something else that we can do, something else that we should do, even something else that we want to do before we focus on our relationship with God. We know that God will always be there, so we put off reading Scripture or prayer or outreach until we have "more time." But remember the words of Scripture:

"But strive first for the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. So do not worry about tomorrow, for tomorrow will bring worries of its own. Today's trouble is enough for today." (Matt. 6:33-34)

We have to learn to stop and intentionally make the time for our faith. We have to consciously choose to do those things that will nourish our souls – pray, read God's word, come and worship with our brothers and sisters in Christ. We have to strive for the kingdom of God and God's justice because if we don't, who will? All of the menial tasks of our lives can wait while we pause each and every day to give our time and our hearts first and foremost to God.

Pine Haven Resident Birthday/Bingo Party





The congregation met informally and briefly following recent worship to direct the donation of accumulated funds. We agreed to donate \$200.00 each to Habitat for Humanity of Goodhue County and of Olmsted County. We also donated \$400 to the Oronoco Food Shelf and \$100 to a new church start program (Net Church) recommended by Pastor Lisa. So far in 2013, we have donated \$1,300 to programs in need. We have \$200 set aside for the pastor's emergency donation and \$100 set aside for donation to Presbyterian Women's missions. There is an additional \$207.70 remaining in the bank account at present. Thanks to all who have donated money, time and talents so we may care for the needs of others.

(O) Presbyterian Women's Mission

Our People of the Church has set aside \$100 to be donated this fall to PW Missions. Every mission and ministry program of PW is supported (in full or in part) through such gifts to the PW Mission programs. O has contributed for many, many years through our mission gift, the birthday offerings and pennies for peace (the jar you see on the counter in the fellowship room). PW missions include projects such as "Little Dresses for Africa" where simple dresses made out of pillow cases are distributed to orphanages, churches and schools in Africa. PW participates in the United Nations' Commission on

the Status of Women which focuses on the empowerment of rural women. Other programs attempt to explore intergenerational dialogue through workshops and retreats; creation of antiracism educational sessions and materials; PW churchwide Gathering is also funded along with Horizons Magazine and other important programs. The Minnesota Council of Churches is offering a No Cost training that will help us in developing a caring congregation. The one day **introduction training** will be **Friday, September 20, 2013**, **8:30 am – 4:00 pm** (breakfast and lunch provided) at MN Council of Churches, 122 W Franklin Avenue, Minneapolis 55404. You are asked to attend three additional 6-hours training **Friday, October 18, November 15 and December 13.**

PURPOSE: To assess, guide and encourage their entire congregation to be actively engaged as a congregation of care by promoting the tools necessary to inspire active involvement with congregants during critical times, such as hospitalization following surgery, living with illness, aging, caregiving, dying, death and grief.

Objective of Training

Build a shared understanding with pastors, ministry leaders, and leadership team on how to <u>integrate</u> caring and preparing for illness, caregiving, end of life and grief into a community of faith.

Outcomes of Training

Participate in a self-exploration of illness, caregiving, end of life, and grief

Understand COC as a sustainable process

Explore and develop sustainable leadership teams

Gain insight and initiate exploration of the congregation demographics and the needs of congregation

Assess congregational care and support

Review and identify current activities and ministries treasures and congregational gifts as well as barriers, opportunities or gaps

Lay a foundation to develop an action plan to ensure that congregants are better prepared to care for those facing illness, end of life, grief and doing caregiving

Acquire an understanding of a practical theology of caring

How to Become a Congregation of Care

Pastor/Clergy commit to recruit a leadership team of 3-4 people from your congregation to attend a free training

The team attends a one day introductory workshop and three ½ day training workshops and participate in homework and assessments

Team commits to implement training in congregation

Graceful Journey provides coaching, support and opportunities to learn and share

Attend an annual summit to support COC and share successes
