Construction Update

You've probably noticed that the road construction connected to the Oronoco City Wastewater/Water Distribution project has made its way to the church's doorstep. The Session is working on taking care of the church's requirements for this project, but we wanted to share some of the pertinent information from the latest update letter:

"Utility Constructions crews from Fitzgerald Excavating will be installing sanitary sewer



forcemain and gravity sewer piping across Minnesota Avenue South at 2nd Street South, 3rd Street South, 5th Street South and 6th Street South (150-feet north Oronoco Self Storage driveway) [This] will require Minnesota Avenue South to be closed from July 5 to approximately July 19 to through traffic. The contractor plans to stagger construction of the utility crossings and will facilitate local resident traffic access via 2nd Avenue SE, 3rd Street SE and 5th Street SE. Detour signage will be erected to direct through traffic around the Minnesota Avenue S closure via the Lake Shady Avenue (West Frontage Road) and the use of the 100th Street / TH 52 bridge and the 5th Street NW / TH 52 overpass bridge. Fitzgerald Excavating will continue installing sanitary sewer forcemain and service piping mostly in the boulevards along 2nd Avenue SW and 3rd Street SW thereafter. The contractor will maintain at least one lane of traffic for resident access on 3rd Street SW and 2nd Avenue SW. Please drive with caution through the construction zone, follow the route delineated by the traffic control cones, and be prepared to stop as directed by contractor flagmen. Access for adjacent property owners may be restricted between 7:00 AM and 7:00 PM (Monday through Saturday). Please plan to park vehicles at a location out of the construction area if you need to leave home during working hours. The contractor will maintain access to roadway and driveways outside of construction hours and all day on Sunday."

From the Pastor ...

¹¹ I, I am the LORD, and there is no savior besides me.
¹² I announced, I saved, I proclaimed, not some stranger among you.
You are my witnesses, says the LORD, and I am God.
¹³ From the dawn of time, I am the one. No one can escape my power.

I act, and who can undo it? ... ¹⁸ Don't remember the prior things; don't ponder ancient history. ¹⁹ Look! I'm doing a new thing; now it sprouts up; don't you recognize it? I'm making a way in the desert, paths in the wilderness. ~ Isaiah 43:11-13, 18-19

In a way, it feels like the whole world is in a bit of a time of renewal. After the global COVID-19 pandemic, people, businesses, and institutions have been and are still being forced to look at all of their "regular" practices to determine whether or not they're important ... whether or not those practices are still effective. And on the flipside, we're also encouraged to explore new things—things we maybe never would have thought of before.

And in our beloved little white church here on the hill, we are no different. There are some things we've decided to let go of. There are other things we've decided to hang onto—things we've decided are important to us. But what about the new things?

What about the new things?

This is a question we're going to have to start thinking about as a congregation. This is a question we're going to have to start exploring in lots of different ways together. And this is a question that no single person is going to have the answer to. It's a question that's going to take input and insight from everyone as we explore what it looks like and what it means to be the body of Christ today ... and tomorrow ... and the next day ... and the next day ...

So if you have an idea, we'd love to hear it. It could be an idea for something in worship.

It could be an idea for a congregational activity—some sort of fellowship gathering or congregational field trip. It could be an outreach idea, either a way to reach out into the community or a way to engage in some mission together. It could be an idea for some sort of study or some sort of small group. There are all sorts of different ways that we can explore doing and being Church together!

And as we explore and do and be, friends, I hope that you will take both inspiration and encouragement from the many times throughout Scripture that we are promised God's presence in the midst of new things. God promises guidance. God promises grace. God promises energy, intelligence, imagination, and love (as our ordination vows remind us). God promises that when we go out to do God's work in the world, we do not go alone. Even when we're unsure of the way ahead ... even when we're discouraged by the obstacles that seem to loom large in front of us ... even when we are tempted to hesitate because the task ahead seems too hard, too big, too undefined, we must remember that God is with us.

On the whiteboard in my office is a question. It's a question that I wrote up there ages ago as my reminder for myself when I write my sermons. The question is: *What is God calling us to do and be?* It's a question I try to work into most of my sermons. (Am I successful 100% of the time? No ... but only God is perfect.) But it's also a question that should drive us as individuals and as a congregation:

What is God calling us to do and be?

Synod School 2023

This year's theme is "Our Family Story." From the Synod School catalogue: "As living and breathing entities of Christ, we are each natural storytellers – whether we believe so or not. ... In a time when biblical stories are picked apart to suit a particular message, we will gather and study familiar stories in new ways in hopes of gaining a new closeness with God, and each other."



This theme is based on a passage from Matthew's gospel: "... All Jesus did that day was tell stories – a long storytelling afternoon. His storytelling fulfilled the prophecy: I will open my mouth and tell stories; I will bring out into the open things hidden since the world's first day." (Matthew 13:34-35, The Message) The convocation speaker will be Rev. Jimmie Ray Hawkins, author and director of the advocacy offices of the PC(USA). Worship leaders will be Rev. Dr. Matt Sauer (morning worship) and Rev. DeEtte Decker (evening worship). And Abbi Long, teacher, writer, speaker, and PhD student, is this year's youth convocation speaker.

Keeping up with the Smith-Mathers

First, the update: According to their last newsletter, Shelvis, Nancy, and their kids have moved to Kampala, Uganda to continue their work in the mission field. We lift up prayers for their health and safety, for the period of adjustment that comes with a move like this (that comes with *any* move, really ... let alone a move to a whole other continent), and for their call and their mission.

For the last few years, we've been helping to support Shelvis and Nancy and their family with our 2nd Sunday Spare Change offering and our prayers. A few times a year, our treasurer would deposit whatever had accumulated from that offering in the bank, then send the total as a donation directly to the Smith-Mathers' Presbyterian Mission Agency (PMA) account.



Due to changes that PMA has made to the way they distribute their mission funds, all contributions no go into a general fund and are distributed to all mission co-workers from there. This change has been made in an attempt to make mission co-worker support more equitable, especially for those coworkers who may be serving in areas that are especially remote or even dangerous and therefore cannot easily relay updates or connect with supporting individuals/congregations.

Donations can still be made in honor of specific mission co-workers – Shelvis and Nancy, in our case. And of course, we can always pray for them and their family in all times and places. But if you can't be here in person to contribute to our Spare Change offering, you can still help.
